8. Auld Lang Syne means Times gone by.
9. Noise making and fireworks on New Year's Eve is believed to have originated in ancient times, when noise and fire were thought to dispel evil spirits and bring good luck.
10. One of the largest annual New Year's Eve celebrations happens in Sydney, Australia.
11. Over 80,000 fireworks are set off from the Sydney Harbour Bridge.
12. The top three destinations in the United States to ring in the New Year are Las Vegas, Disney World and New York City.
13. Food plays a big role in New Year's traditions. Eating black-eyed peas, ham or cabbage are thought to bring prosperity. Stay away from bad luck foods like lobsters, because they move backwards, and chicken, because they scratch in reverse. It is believed that eating these on New Year's day might cause a reversal of fortune.
14. People in Edinburgh, UK celebrate the new year by people gather for a large organized street party.
15. According to this survey, 40 to 45 percent of American adults make one or more resolutions each year. The top New Year's resolutions include weight loss, exercise, quitting smoking and better money management. By the second week of January, 25 percent of people have abandoned their resolutions.
16. A centenary clock is lowered at 23:59:48 on New Year's Eve in Madrid, Spain.
17. In Italy, people wear red underwear on New Year's Day as a symbol of good luck for the upcoming year.
18. On New Year 's Eve in Raleigh, NC, a First Night celebration is a family friendly, non alcoholic celebration of the New Year.
19. The top 10 resolutions are usually to lose weight, eat more healthily, exercise more, stop smoking, stick to a budget, save money, get more organized, be more patient, find a better job and to just be a better person over all.
20. The most popular New Year's Day parade is the Tournament of Roses.
21. Pasadena's Valley hunt clubs first parade was in 1890 Tournament of Roses.
22. New York's Waterford crystal ball is 6 foot diameter and weighs in at a whopping 1,070 pounds.
23. The crystal ball begins lowering in Times Square at $11: 59 \mathrm{pm}$.
24. Father Time is a mythical personification of time.
25. A pine cone dropped on New Year's Eve in Flagstaff, Arizona; meanwhile an acorn is dropped in Raleigh, NC.
26. Bangor, Maine drops a purple beach ball decorated with Christmas lights on New Year's Eve.
27. A countdown done with an elevator is done in Seattle.
28. Many cultures believe that anything given or taken on New Year, in the shape of a ring is good luck, because it symbolizes "coming full circle".
29. Celebrating New Year on January 1 is purely arbitrary, as neither it has agricultural significance nor astronomical. Many countries still celebrate it in spring, the season of rebirth of new crops.
30. The Chinese New Year is known as the Lunar New Year or the Spring Festival.
31. To symbolize a sweet new year in Rosh Hashanah, apples and honey are eaten.
32. In the ancient Roman calendar the new year begins March 1.
33. The New Year's Ball in New York's Time Square was first dropped on December 31, 1907.
