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

SUFFERING IN SILENCE: HOW TO DEAL WITH SOCIAL ISOLATION

Loneliness is described as the sadness resulting from the negative difference between a person's desire for social relationships and what they actually experience. A person impacted by consuming loneliness is said to be suffering from "social isolation". In other words, they feel remote from most people. Social isolation is a growing epidemic that has proven to cause dire physical, mental, emotional, spiritual and social consequences. This by-product of loneliness is a serious public health problem in many developed nations, including the United States. For example, today's greatest health threat facing middle-aged men is not smoking or obesity; its loneliness. I've always thought of loneliness is a senior citizen problem, but research says otherwise. A recent study¹ shows young people (ages 16-24) are actually lonelier than older adults! After studying this new finding, I believe we are becoming a nation of "social loners."

The percentage of Americans who claim they have trusted friends in their lives has been in decline since 1950. Researchers call it "American Social Isolation." This means close friends are less common today. An American's list of close friends has shrunk over the past 25 years from three down to two. One in five Americans feels lonely or socially isolated most days. As a result, their health, relationships and work suffer as a result. If the quality of a person's life is based on those life factors, they could be termed "the living dead".



Human beings have a basic need to belong. We are motivated to develop friendships. Our individual physical and mental systems are, therefore, embedded in an even larger system of interrelationships with others. For example, every week when we come together my personal life is impacted positively by being a part of REUMC. At the same time, every individual in attendance influences our entire group.

The tragedy and paradox of the postmodern world is that, while technological advancements have dramatically improved our capability to connect, a growing number of people are becoming disconnected from others. As a result, mega churches are struggling as they discover that the technology they have relied on to reach thousands of people cannot meet those same people's basic relationship needs. In response to this dilemma, many mega churches are adding a weekly or monthly "small group" approach (meetings limited to 5 to 20 people) in an effort to build lasting interpersonal relationships. They are beginning to understand that human connection lies at the heart of human wellbeing. They are learning that meaningful social connections can overcome the loneliness brought on by our shallow, hyper-connected digital age.

So, the small church approach like ours matters! Coming together as a community matters! It is not only affecting your spiritual life, but your social existence. When you have a crisis moment in life, your trusted friends from your small church (your spiritual community) are the most likely ones to show up and support you.

Sometimes we don't know what we need. However, I believe we can all agree that many people in our community need to be more connected. Many struggle with the sadness of solitude, lack of belonging, love and attachment. As children, we looked for approval from our parents. It was our survival mechanism. As adults, we feel a sense of belonging when we are socially connected to other adults.

We at REUMC exist so you can be part of this connected community. We are here to celebrate the sacredness of our mutual spiritual connection through Christ.

By showing up at church you are beating the culprit of social isolation. All you need to do is to show up. You belong here in this connected community. Your children belong here. Physical connection is a necessity for your children to thrive, especially in their early years. You are part of the family, the family of God. We don't need a million relationships, but we need a few in which we feel safe.

Jesus chose to surround himself with a community of disciples. If the Son of the Most High God demonstrates the importance and necessity of community in his own life, then perhaps it can serve as a reminder for us to know the importance of genuine relationships for our own betterment (health and healing). This requires a willingness to be vulnerable, authentic and specifically loving.

Remember: It takes intentional effort to build a healthy community that connects.


VOLUNTEER needed to power wash the bricks surrounding the base hold the old church bell on west side of church; also, the bricks on the outside of the church building's west and north side.


